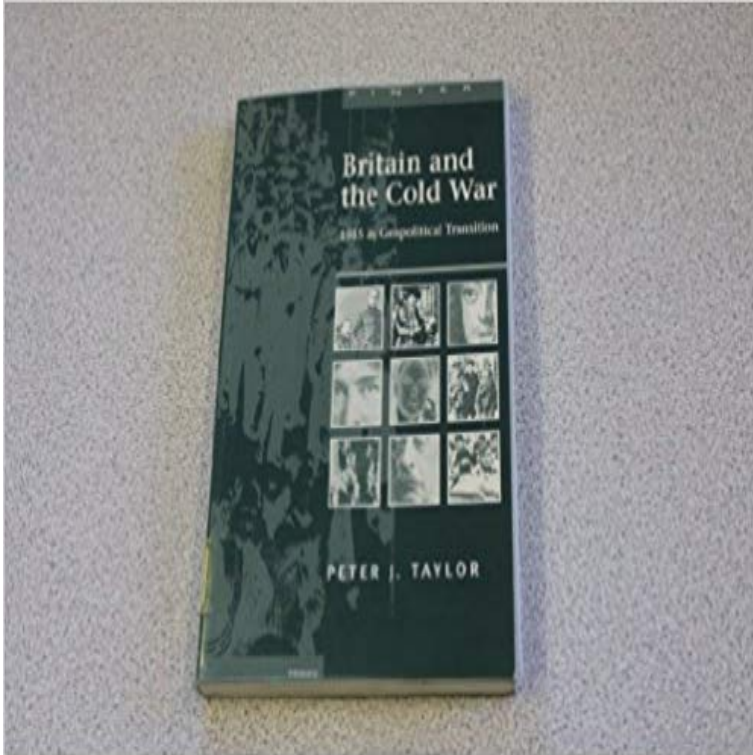


Britain and the Cold War: 1945 as Geopolitical Transition (Geography & International Relations)
