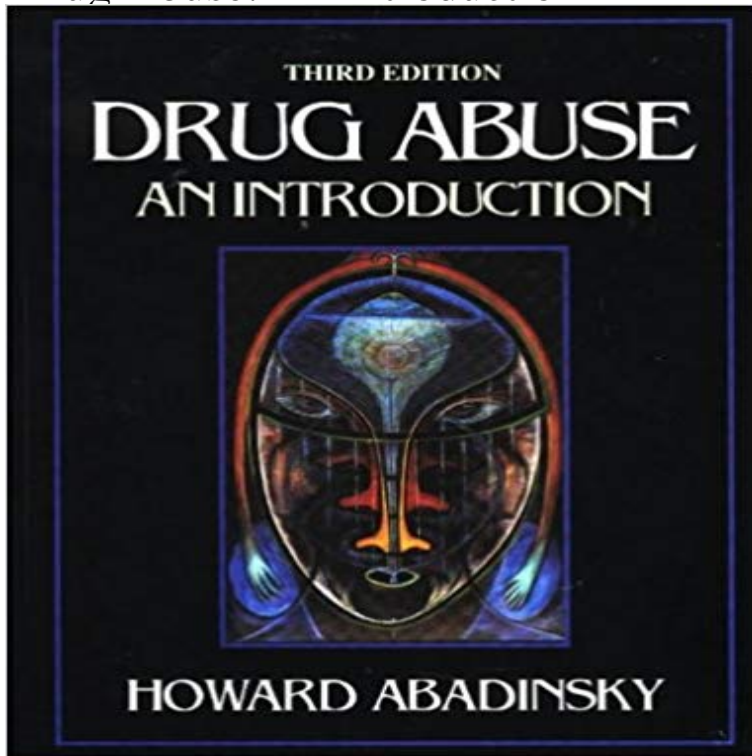


## Drug Abuse: An Introduction
